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THE SECOND CYCLE OF THE TAKT ACADEMY STARTED:

TRAINING AND JOB OPPORTUNITIES IN PROMISING B&H INDUSTRIES

The Hastor Foundation, with the support of the Embassy of Switzerland, officially opened the second cycle of the program TAKT which will in the next month provide students with knowledge and skills needed for work in industries of fashion, textiles, and furniture and automotive industry. The program offers a systematic approach to adapting the education system to labour market needs and includes programs for the production and management processes. The target group are graduates of secondary vocational / technical schools and graduates of the Faculty of Social and technical colleges.

"Having successfully completed the first cycle of training for young leaders in the automotive industry we have opened a new call for participants of the second cycle. Reported staff requirements are distributed by education level with added basic information about the competencies needed to perform these functions. Over 70 participants will go through the program and they will then get the opportunity for employment in various areas of ASA Prevent Group", said Seid Fijuljanin, the director of the Hastor Foundation and added that this is a unique opportunity for young people to gain competitive skills in the labour market.



Tenaid Zukic is a student of the first generation of TAKT Academy, and today he works on the position of technical project coordinator in the Prevent Group. He, together with his colleague Selma Spago who also, after TAKT Academy, got her first job, addressed the future students. They stressed the importance of such training in the process of preparing for the labour market and recommend to future participants to seize the opportunity they were given.

Adis Gljiva applied for TAKT Academy for a second time, which according to him says a lot about the motivation to go through the training process. "I am happy that I got a chance to broaden my practical knowledge and learn from some of the best experts in the field of industrial production. I believe that this event will contribute to the improvement of my professional development", said Adis during the opening ceremony of the Academy.

TAKT Academy will use modern methodology for training which will consist of a theoretical part with lectures given by industry experts and practical classes that will run on the location of a potential employer.



A making process of the bookmark:

Create a strip width of 5 cm and a height of 21 cm on the cardboard A4 and cut it.

Draw what you want or paste. I recommend that you use a napkin, if they have some form that can be cut out. I picked Pikachu with a Poke Ball, as can easily make a semicircle around the ball.

I painted Pikachu after I drew it. On your bookmarks, you can write an inspirational quote.

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TEACHER'S SECTION January 27th, 2017

In Hadzici, on January 27th 2017, in the building of a secondary school, in a warm classroom, from 10 o'clock Muharema Sabanovic volunteers with five students. The two boys are primary school students who are mentally disabled and come accompanied by their mother, and three other students are the fourth year of a secondary school. Muharema explained to me that she is coping well with this group of children.

"I give secondary school students tasks that they can perform quietly and I occasionally supervise, while talking to the elementary school students. For them I have to prepare a lot of obvious resources and I need to repeat the same task many times to make them understand me, because when they manage to understand, then delve into work and I can be commit myself to the secondary school students."

I liked this combined work and so I took a task to keep time with the primary school students. Upon completion of the time I gave a couple of instructions to Muharema and secondary school students. Then I greeted with them and left for Vogosca.

On Saturday, 28th January 2017, I start my car that shows the temperature of minus 13 degrees Celsius. I'm on my way to Tomislavgrad where six students scheduled a meeting with 23 students from primary and secondary schools. I plan to stop by in Novi Travnik too, in the Youth Centre where Petak Lejla scheduled her volunteer meeting with 17 students; the plan is to come to Bugojno in the building of the Grammar school where Dautbegovic Amna and Muratspahic Tarik will be with their 38 students. If everything is going to be well today I could manage to meet with 9 students and 78 pupils, scholarship holders of the Hastor Foundation.

Even though thick fog reduced movement speed I came at 8:10 am to the Youth Centre in Novi Travnik where Lejla waited for me with students who in this cold came from villages, some of them more than 20 kilometres far away. They said that they have problems on Sundays because the buses do not ride, so I asked Lejla that the future meetings should not be planned on Sundays. I talked with students of fourth year of a secondary school about their further education. I gave a couple of instructions, and then moved to Bugojno. I passed Rostovo with no difficulties even though here and there was still some ice (in shady places). In Bugojno, in a warm classroom of the Grammar school Amna and Tarik told me what are they doing now and what they will do during the day. Again short talk with students about their learning and their plans for further education. Everyone agrees that this gathering is good

for them. One student said that he preferres coming to these meetings, rather than being home or in school at regular classes. I had feeling that the students established a good relationship with pupils so I greeted them and left to Tomislavgrad. At exactly 11:20 o'clock I entered the classroom in the building of the Vocational School in Tomislavgrad where I found Bagaric Josipa, Bukvic Atif and Sekelja Ana in a working atmosphere. I waited for them to finish the class they started, and then joined this nice gathering. I talked to them and learned that students are well prepared for exams in their schools, but that they are also very happy with their mentors. I asked for Sanela, Ahmed and Ana. They told me that they went home. I called all three of them one by one and they explained their reasons. Since I do not care for such reasons I told them to contact the administration of the Hastor Foundation noting that if I'm being asked they lost their scholarship. As it was already 13:00 o'clock, I greeted them and left for Vogosca.

Sedin Mrackic calls me from Fojnica and says that they have bad conditions at school in Ostruznica, asking me whether tomorrow 29th January 2017. they can volunteer in another building of primary school "Muhsin Rizvic"?

I asked him: "Will the kids know where to come?"

"If you approve it, the children will be informed."


"All right, you have my permission." I told him and I thought of going there to see them and convince myself that he is telling the truth. At eleven o'clock, I came into a warm classroom of the elementary school "Muhsin Rizvic" in Fojnica. Mrackic Sedin, Mehic Mirza and Mesa Ensar hang out with students of secondary and primary schools. While they were discussing about the topic: "What are useful ways to spend your free time." I observed how they were doing it and then joined. In the meantime, I asked for Krsic Dalila. They told me she was sick. I called her and she responded from the house. She said he is sick. I asked her why she didn't call to inform me. She began to apologize. I told her to write that to the administration of the Hastor Foundation and ended the conversation. I talked a little bit more with those present, and then went further. During these visits from conversations with students of fourth year of secondary school I learned of their desire to enrol next year not to college but to a private laid senior year of medical school, so they can go abroad as medical staff to work there and earn that way for life. This is another example of how our educated youth is going to leave Bosnia and Herzegovina.
