
Una Karabeg



Emir Bakunić



Edna considers graphic design to be one of the ways for efficiently communicating important topics in the society. An example which supports this statement is her last project which dealt with the topic of violence against women.

Besides college-related commitments, I believe it is also very important to be an active community member and to use one's knowledge to help others. It is precisely due to this reason that I work on monthly projects which focus on young pupils and students.

One of the projects that Edna has started was a charity campaign for the members of the public facility "The Center for Children and Adults in Bosnia and Herzegovina", where she organized promotional materials and contacted different companies based in Visoko and Sarajevo with the aim of encouraging them to donate resources. Edna has been organizing this project for one year already. A result of this work is the fact that, at the end of the last year, she successfully collected gifts for over 30 children which contained basic hygiene products and necessities.

Edna plans projects in accordance with her skills; but, as we see, creativity surely is her virtue. She expanded her knowledge and experience through an exchange program in the US within the framework of the "YES" program. That was an occasion where she received an opportunity to expand her knowledge of the English language, but also to present her experience and ideas to others. A result of these learning activities was a club which Edna organized. Namely, that was an English-speaking club named "English to Youth"; on this occasion, she was having weekly meetings with four students from elementary and high school where they worked on improving grammar, enriching the vocabulary, and practicing speaking in English.

Edna's activities didn't end there. In 2021, she started a book club named "Between the Lines", where she organizes meetings with eight club members once a month in order for them to talk about an author and a book which they previously read. This has given the members a possibility to broaden their horizons regarding various social circumstances we deal with. The activity encourages young people to read, helps them with forming and presenting ideas, and it also educates them about the basics of literature. Edna sees her free time as a chance to read, because, as she says, reading is her favorite activity.





All scholarship holders have different views about the Foundation, but all the views are within the scopes of praise and gratitude. Edna says this about the Foundation:



Volunteering is part of almost every civilization's history, and, because of its immeasurable benefits, it deserves special attention; the attention which, if directed properly, can lead to the spreading of positive ideas and actions from the local level to the historical level, maybe even the level of civilization. Nowadays, volunteers play an important role in the progress of developed countries, developing countries, and within national or other programs for humanitarian aid, technical cooperation and the promotion of human rights, peace, and democracy. The scholarship holder Nejla Suljević comes from Brčko. She is a fourth-year student at the Faculty of Dentistry and its clinics at the University of Sarajevo – where she currently lives, as well. This is her third year as a scholarship holder of the Hastor Foundation, which is something that she is very proud of, especially because it was the University of Sarajevo that recommended her for receiving the scholarship on the grounds of her being one of the most successful students at the Faculty of Dentistry.

Nejla started writing the pages of her story of volunteering and activism as early as when she was in the elementary school, realizing then that an important part of development and education is to learn how to give and help. Some of the first organizations whose work she joined were: SEECEL – Southeast European Centre for Entrepreneurial Learning, Red Cross, Interreligious Council in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and PRONI Center for Youth Development.

One of her favorite projects that she oversaw lately was the one realized with the Youth Center "Vermont" in Brčko when charity campaigns for children who work and/or live on the street were organized.

Volunteering and working with children at the Daily center were surely some of my most notable activities. A need to open a center of this kind had existed for a long time, so that all children could have a safe place for studying, playing, and growing up. Spending time with children, teaching them how to read and write, was a great privilege and an indescribable pleasure.

By arriving in Sarajevo and by becoming a member of the Foundation, she continued doing most of her volunteer work in Sarajevo by giving private lessons. Still, out of the entire volunteer work, the activity that makes Nejla the proudest is related to her hometown located on the right bank of the Sava River.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, I part-time joined the Foundation/Legata Ekmečić in Brčko; so, I would like to use this opportunity to share a few pieces of information regarding the work of this incredible institution. In Brčko in 2017, a rich exhibition of art legacy, paintings, drawings, graphics, statutes, publicist papers and scientific works was opened for the public, as well as a rich and valuable library of the Ekmečić family. Many individuals from this family, the Ekmečić brothers and the Morić cousins, left a notable trace on the culture and art of Bosnia and Herzegovina, the region, and Europe; so, the role of this organization is highly important, because it represents a permanent reminder of the values and importance of culture, especially in Brčko, in the time when the importance of culture is marginalized.

At this Foundation, Nejla had a chance to assist in creating the first and unique souvenir of Brčko. That is the first artistic souvenir designed by the academic sculptor Sead Ekmečić in 1963. The souvenir was produced to mark the occasion of relocating "the Fountain of Youth – Gold Fish" to a new place. The souvenir is a replica of the fountain, completely identical to the original, produced with contemporary digital technologies, yet shaped manually.

Together with a few more volunteers from the Foundation/Legata Ekmečić, Nejla received a chance to learn from a professional art conservator and restorer who was doing the jobs of molding and producing the souvenir itself. The souvenir molding was done in a silicone kit, which was later manually refined and covered with bronze patina. After that, the souvenir was placed on a stand made from an autochthonous type of oak tree found around the Sava River which had been taken from unique forests of the pedunculate oak located around the Sava River, near Brčko.

It was a great privilege to watch and assist in such a big and important event for our city. For this reason, I believe that volunteer engagement will always be the most valuable in our own local community in which we live and work, because that is the way we can achieve the greatest effect. The community we live in is the one we know the best, which makes us aware of all the pros and cons which the life in it brings.



We can draw a conclusion from this example that our community is in a desperate need for the pillars of its identity. In the time when wrong values and vanity are being offered as the model of life, culture and art stand as universal values and strength which point to the right direction, light, importance, and identity.

When she talks about volunteering, Nejla relentlessly emphasizes its importance for the personal growth and development. She claims that volunteering helped her master the skills in all fields, starting from relieving herself from stage fright, over mastering her communication skills, all the way to building her self-confidence.

These occasions are even more valuable because of all of those experiences that we gather and friendships that we make; however, no matter what are our motives for volunteering at the beginning, I believe all of that is very quickly turned into solely enriching our CVs and working on ourselves. The real magic of volunteering and life in general is felt when we do something for someone who will never be able to repay us, and our only motive for that is empathy. At the end, she had this to say to scholarship holders: Things we do for ourselves die with us; things we do for others will remain and are immortal. Let us be proud members of the Hastor Foundation and do volunteer work!


ALUMNI OF THE MONTH

One of our alumni helped our work immensely so we dedicate the text below to him.

Sanel Delić's story begins in Bugojno, where he graduated from the Technical High School, majoring as a construction technician. He became a scholarship holder of the Hastor Foundation at the beginning of the second grade of high school, in 2008, and he maintained that status until the end of his studies, in 2016. After graduating from high school, Sanel enrolled in the Department of architecture at Burch International University where he recieved a bachelor's and a master's degree. During the second cycle of studies, he became an employee of Walter BIM Solutions, which in the meantime grew into a group and split into two companies, so that Sanel is now part of Walter Code. The status of a Hastor Foundation scholarship holder helped him a lot during this period, partly because of the scholarship, but above all because of the acquired skills and habits during volunteering and work in the administration. The skills and work habits he acquired during that period helped him during his studies, while looking for a job, but also now while he is working.

Although Sanel officially stopped being a scholarship holder of the Foundation 5 years ago, he is still involved in the work of the Foundation because during his studies he learned to program independently, both out of curiosity and out of necessity, and created a web application currently used by scholarship students to record volunteer hours. What he is especially proud of is the fact that over 12 thousand reports have been sent through the application and over 200 thousand volunteer hours have been recorded.

INTERESTING FACTS

World's most famous religions

Religion occupies an extremely important place in the history of human civilization. It is believed that the first form of religion originated when our primitive ancestors could not explain natural phenomena such as drought, rain, thunder, so they attributed them to higher beings. Today, religion also occupies a significant place in our societies and, as evidenced by numerous world studies, there are about 4,200 religions, churches, religious groups and cultures.

Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Islam and Christianity are some of the largest religions in the world and read about some of the lesser known in our area below.

Sikhism

It is a religion that originated in northwestern India in the 15th century and is based on the teachings of Guru Nanak and his 10 followers. Nanak taught that God is one, and he called God Sat Nam (true name), however, Nanak retained the belief in reincarnation and karma (which is practiced in Buddhism and Hinduism). Those who practice this religion are called Sikh people, and the name derives from the word Sikh which means "one who seeks the truth", and Sikhism is based on true life. Sikhism is practiced by about 25 million people worldwide.

Cao Dai (Dadoism)

This hybrid belief system originates from Vietnam, on whose soil it was founded in 1926, and is described as a true national Vietnamese religion. The belief was founded by Ngo Van Chieu, a former administrator who believed he had received a supernatural message from a deity during one session. Cao Dai relies on the ethical precepts of Confucianism, various Taoist practices, theories of karma and reincarnation from Buddhism, and a hierarchical structure from Roman Catholicism. This religion today has over 4 million followers who pay great attention to universal concepts such as justice, love, peace and tolerance.

Taoism

Taoism originated in China about 2,000 years ago, and the first philosopher of this religion was Lao Tzu, who is believed to have written the main text of this religion called the "Dao Daing" (Tao te ching). After the publication of this book, Taoism soon began to spread to Japan and other surrounding countries, where it woven into many aspects of life there such as art, literature, medicine and even politics. There are about 12 million followers of this religion, and it is characterized by a diet based on all-day fasting based on veganism. Nutrition is extremely important in Taoism because it is believed to contribute to a person's psychological well-being.

Munism

Munism is a religion also known as Sinism, Shingyo, or Korean shamanism, and is closely associated with traditional Korean culture and history. The key characteristics of this religion are the belief in the existence of spirits, souls and gods as well as the belief that they inhabit the spiritual world. The spiritual leaders of Munism, known as the "Mundazni", are usually women who act as intermediaries between gods and men. Worldwide, this religion has about 10 million followers.

INCLUSION IS NOT AN ILLUSION

Inclusion must not be an illusion. It doesn't take much to put it into practice – it's enough to start with ourselves and our prejudices. Can't we be tolerant enough to treat everyone the same way? Why do we have to "judge a book by its cover"?

We need to know that the value of something cannot be recognized only by what we see on the surface. Every child, everyone with a disability, every person different from others in any way, should be able to find their place within the society in accordance with their needs.

Should someone be ashamed if they have a disease that is not their fault? I am still a child, but I know that one should be ashamed only of theft, lies and cheating, and not of one's appearance or any short-comings. We need to take a hard look into the mirror if we are insulting, swearing, belittling, or behaving badly towards someone, these are distorted values that need to be corrected.

Why would anyone among us feel bad or rejected if they have some developmental difficulties? Why would we distance ourselves from these people? Isn't, after all, the life of each of us full of various difficulties of any form? Some have difficulty solving math problems, some have difficulty writing their paper assignments, someone who has just passed their driving test might have trouble parking their car... It is known that this is perfectly fine and we accept it as normal. Then why is it wrong when someone has developmental difficulties, why can't our society accept him? Why in our society do children with disabilities not have the same opportunities and chances to develop their potential as other children?

The biggest obstacles to the inclusion of these people in society and the community are lack of information, prejudice, and preconceived negative opinions about someone based on one characteristic they possess, but we are not all the same. That is why inclusion is not an illusion. Many of us know that, for example, attending regular classes for children with disabilities at school is also good for children without disabilities because it teaches them social skills, tolerance and respect for diversity. Any association with people with disabilities makes us a better person, we learn to be patient, to share, to be more sensitive and considerate. Isn't it better to be patient and careful than impudent, rude and cruel?

Because of all that, I really think, and constantly repeat, that inclusion is not an illusion. The task of all of us is to get involved and help as much as possible in the fight against prejudice, to help develop tolerance and to fight against all forms of discrimination.

Here is a simple start: every time we pass a car parked in a place reserved for people with disabilities, even though we are young, we need to bring people's attention to that. Every time someone stops their vehicle with the front wheels on the sidewalk and the rear on the street, saying that they need to run to the store or the bakery for just two minutes, we need to warn them and point out that someone in a wheelchair won't be able to cross the path. We need to warn people not to do this, even if they're our own parents. We may think that it is impossible to solve the big problem of inclusion with such small things. However, such reactions may not reach every driver, but there are certainly those who would stop and think about what told them.
