### SUMMER VACATION IN HOLLAND 2023


In addition to many successful projects, the Hastor Foundation can also boast of the "Summer Vacation in the Netherlands" project, which it implements with particular pleasure every year in cooperation with the Dutch organization "Stichting Kinderhulp Bosnië". The idea of the project is to give children from rural areas and with poor socioeconomic status the opportunity to visit the Netherlands, make lifelong friendships and gain memorable experiences. This year, the project was implemented in June and 28 children from Kaćuni, Novi Travnik and Opara were given the opportunity to visit the wonderful land of tulips.

Considering that a large number of applications arrived, the administration of the Hastor Foundation had a difficult task to choose those students who would travel to the Netherlands. After careful selection, she decided to entrust her scholarship students, Amila Glamočak and Edna Porča, who enthusiastically took on the role of accompanying our little travelers. Amila says that she eagerly sent the motivational letter and eagerly awaited the email with the answer:

I was overjoyed when they chose me and I was impatiently waiting to meet the colleague I was going with. Due to lack of time, we met via video call. Edna and I had many questions and doubts about how we would overcome the various challenges on this trip because there were more children involved, but with the advice of the students who went on this trip last year, we prepared very well. The 9th of June came, the day of departure, when Edna and I saw each other live for the first time, we got along great and at the same time took on the role of leaders. I knew right away that this would be an unforgettable experience because I had a great colleague.

Amila points out that the moment of departure was very emotional both for the children who are leaving their home for the first time for such a long period and for the parents. However, as soon as everyone settled in the bus, she and Edna did their best to entertain the children and awaken in them the adventurous spirit necessary for the trip. Edna says that she enjoyed watching the children's curiosity and need for socializing grow day by day:

The trip started with a lot of excitement and curiosity among the children as well as myself and my colleague Amila. We knew that this experience brought great responsibility, but with the support of the administration of the Hastor Foundation, we felt ready for this special challenge.



Every moment spent with the children was priceless. From activity to activity, every day they became more and more relaxed, open and curious. I was delighted to see how quickly they made connections with each other and how readily they shared their stories with me and the other participants. It was especially emotional to see how the children were impressed by their arrival in the Netherlands. Their enthusiasm and curiosity towards the new culture was simply incredible. The guide's role was not only to provide information and guide them through the activities, but also to be there as a support and guiding hand during their journey.

Although they had a lot of time to get to know and socialize with the families they stayed with in the Netherlands, the children had workshops and activities planned every day that will make their stay unforgettable and which, among other things, were an opportunity to develop empathy and other positive trait. Amila briefly presented all these activities to us:

On Sunday, June 11, we had our first workshop where the children painted animal figurines, after which we were all given special gifts. All our activities lasted quite a long time and I enjoyed spending time with the children. The next day we went to visit the families where the children are spending their summer vacation. I admired their caring and generous attitude towards children. I saw how hard they try to provide the children with an incredible summer vacation that they will remember for a lifetime, and through it they learn the best human qualities. On Tuesday, June 11, we went to the Hulie playground, where we spent seven hours. Children had fun on various trampolines, slides, and also in the pool. On Thursday, June 15, followed the Corn Maze, Maisdoolhof. The children had a lot to experience, play and learn. Some of the activities were: a maze, a go-kart with a speedometer, a cornhole, a bocce court, 3 types of stacking blocks that were particularly interesting to some, so they competed to build the biggest structure. They also saw various animals here. Already on June 18, we had a picnic, we enjoyed a variety of food and games with the children. The next day we played Bingo, where all the children got prizes, it was interesting to watch them waiting for each next number that might bring them one of the prizes. After Bingo we went horse riding. The days passed, and it was getting more and more interesting for us, in the second week the children got used to being separated from their parents very well.



On Wednesday, June 21, we spent the whole day at Efteling, a fantasy theme park in Kaatsheuvel. In this park, attractions reflect elements of ancient myths and legends, fairy tales, fables and folklore. We went to numerous attractions, alternated with some of the scariest ones such as the Dive coaster free fall with a height of 30 m and a speed of 90 km/h, and then relaxing attractions would follow. Park Efteling was definitely the children's favorite, as we found out from the survey at the end of the trip.

When it comes to the families that hosted the children, Edna says that they delighted her with their treatment of the children and that many of the children wanted to stay in contact with their chosen families for a long time and even visit them sometime in the future:

The host families also deserve praise. Their warmth, openness and desire to provide the children with the best possible vacation through various activities, delicious food and introduction to Dutch culture was incredible. Ending the trip brought a mix of emotions – joy at the new friendships we made and sadness at having to say goodbye. But I know that the memories of this trip will remain deeply embedded in my heart forever.



Although she and her colleague Amila assumed a great responsibility and obligation by going on this trip, they pointed out that this was a great opportunity for them to visit a wonderful country and gain new unforgettable experiences. During the second week of their stay in the Netherlands, they had more time for themselves and decided to use it in the best possible way. They toured the cities, went for a walk, went shopping, rode bicycles, met new people, and in the meantime they moved to another family, where they were also supposed to stay. Staying in Amsterdam for the whole day is a special experience that they decided to treat themselves to, they were delighted by the long ride on the canals of Amsterdam as well as learning about the history of the city and a guided tour of the State Museum. They say that there is still a lot left for them to visit in Amsterdam and that they definitely decided to return to that beautiful city at the first opportunity in the future.

Amila shared with us her impressions from her last evening in the Netherlands, as well as some of her emotions from her return to Bosnia and Herzegovina:

The last, and at the same time, farewell night was on June 23, it was something special that I will remember for a long time, each of us had to prepare choreographies, the children did very well and we enjoyed ourselves, sang and danced the whole night. It was especially emotional at the end of the evening when the children thanked the families who hosted them and gave them flowers. All the activities for the 16 days spent in the Netherlands were very well organized and interesting for the children, they looked forward to every next activity. The morning before returning to Bosnia was very emotional, tears were visible on our faces, greeting everyone in front of the bus took a long time. After 16 wonderful days we had to leave. The trip went without a hitch. The parents in Bosnia welcomed them with hugs, and the children were impatiently waiting to show them all the gifts from the Netherlands. At the end of this trip, the children said that it was much better than they expected, they said that they would like to stay in touch with the families they stayed with, and some even wanted to live in the Netherlands.

They especially thanked the Hastor Foundation for this opportunity, but also the wonderful members of the "Stichting Kinderhulp Bosnië" organization who worked diligently with the aim of helping the children and therefore showed them the strength and importance of the community and enabled them to be part of an unforgettable experience for children from Bosnia and Herzegovina. They point out that on this trip they gained many skills and got to know a new culture, and in addition, they had the opportunity to look at the happy faces of the younger scholars and admire the children's joy because of the trip and the new experience, which, they say, particularly fulfilled them. They pointed out that through this trip they saw for the umpteenth time that the Hastor Foundation contributed to the children's happiness, which they will undoubtedly remember forever.

Through the example of Edna and Amila, the Hastor Foundation once again confirmed the importance of its mission in our country and how young are the bearers of the future.

## MALE PRIČE VELIKIH VOLONTERA

Stories worth reading are often hidden in the lives of people who are sometimes unaware of how inspiring they really are. Scholarship holders of the Hastor Foundation contribute to the creation of a better and happier today with their continuous volunteer activities. By talking about important topics, they help high school and elementary school students to create great ambitions and learn true values. One wonderful volunteer story comes from Maglaj and it is told to us by Edin Šahbaz, a student mentor who regularly designs creative activities that he implements with his volunteer group at monthly meetings.

The volunteer group in which Edin is a mentor consists of 10 high school students, and the schools the students attend are Edhem Mulabdić Gymnasium, Mixed High School, Maglaj and Žepče Mixed High School. They most often volunteer at the premises of the Red Cross in Maglaj, but they are very happy to take advantage of these summer days to socialize in nature. Nature is certainly the starting point for every inspiration that is born in the mind of a person. She definitely inspired our scholarship holder, who this month handled the planned topics with his volunteer group in an interesting way.

They started the meeting with the planned topic, and the introduction to the topic was a conversation with the students about their talents, what talents and skills they possess and in what ways they use them. From the informative part of that conversation, they moved on to the conversation about discovering personal maximum. They talked about how to recognize the talents we possess, how to work on them and how to use these talents for useful purposes. They also watched Steve Harvey's short video "Steve Harvey Talks About How You Can Identify Your God Given Gift", which focuses on that topic, as well as "Follow Your Gift, Not Your Passion", which talks about using our skills.

Although every success requires effort and work, there are other things that make the path to achieving your goals easier. Edin discussed with his group of students about the keys to success and what measures we should take in order to be more successful people. They watched a 10-minute video on that topic and then had a short discussion about the views expressed in the video. One very interesting takeaway from their discussion is that fear is one of the main obstacles to success. n order to get rid of fears, it is important to know how we can reduce them and, if possible, completely remove them from our lives. After the exchange of information that easily fills the students, the mentor opened an interesting session in which the students shared with each other what they want to achieve in their future, taking into account the talents they possess.

The answers were interesting and showed the creativity and individuality of each scholar. The end of the meeting was scheduled for a more dynamic aspect of the topic discussed, and they discussed how to turn your hobby into a source of income. This topic opened the door to various ideas and ways of making money by using your own skills. The students mentioned some of the most popular skills today, but the emphasis was placed on the fact that any skill/talent can be profitable and useful if channeled in the right way.

What additionally contributed to the beauty of this meeting was certainly the fortress in Maglaj, which gave our scholars the opportunity to embrace the pearl of their city and gain knowledge while enjoying the beauty of their hometown. The final part of the meeting was an escape from everyday reality and the students spent it playing social games and admiring the view of the city.

In the month of April, this hard-working group carried out an ecological cleanup in the area of Maglaj, in order to mark the World Day of Doing Good.





Edin Šahbaz is a successful student at the Faculty of Traffic and Communications, as well as a successful scholarship holder, volunteer and mentor, which we had the opportunity to see before because his successes enriched the pages of our newsletter. Speaking about his way of communicating with the volunteer group, Edin says the following: I see mentoring as an opportunity to facilitate someone's path to realizing their dreams. Our meetings exude freedom, which has always been my goal. I look forward to our gatherings, and I feel that the students also like to fulfill their volunteer obligations. This is my confirmation that I am doing the right thing and I plan to continue trying to organize successful and interesting meetings that we will all remember fondly.

Throughout history, Maglaj has given birth to great people, and our scholarship recipients are proof that this practice did not remain in the past, but extends far into our days and has the potential to reach far into the future. Their meetings at the fortress will build great fortresses of knowledge that no wind can shake and that neither time nor years can destroy.


Selma recognizes the importance of the Hastor Foundation as the foundation for creating positive social changes:



Volunteer work became a daily part of her routine, so she joined various non-governmental organizations, and one of them is the "Bravo" organization, where she is a member of the steering committee and project assistant.

When she was about to become a mentor, she was fearful of how well was she going to manage and if she would become a good-enough leader of a group. Still, with the help of her then-mentors, Ajla realized how much of a new experience each volunteering was and that it makes our lives more beautiful.

Admir tells us how his further educational path went:

After finishing high school, I entered the Faculty of Philosophy, Department of Bosnian, Croatian and Serbian Language and Literature. Thank God, I finished all four years on time. At the beginning of the third year of study, I learned about the Hastor Foundation through a friend. I really had no idea about the enormous efforts, financial support and time that the Foundation invests in the education of young people until I became a proud member of it. I then had a really emotional interview with our teacher Ramo and Nermin. Given that I was in a difficult financial situation at the time, that contributed even more to everything being like that.

During the period of volunteering, the volunteer meetings and workshops of different character, trainings and trainings that helped him to build himself as a person were the most etched in Admir's memory. Meetings with school-age scholarship holders contributed to the additional rapprochement of all members of this large family!

Considering that Admir became a scholarship holder in the first years of the establishment of the Hastor Foundation itself, his memories bear the fragrance of the beginnings of the positive story that the Foundation has been writing throughout all these years, which, as he points out, makes him particularly happy, fulfilled and proud. # CHARTER OF BAN KULIN

There are parts of the cultural heritage of Bosnia and Herzegovina that are more or less covered in public discourse. Among the more famous legacies from the history of our country is the Charter of Ban Kulin signed on August 29, 1189. However, the importance of this charter as the "birth certificate of Bosnian statehood" is mainly emphasized, which is absolutely wrong if you consider that Bosnia was not created in 1189, when the Ban Kulin Charter was signed, but existed much earlier, as evidenced by its mention in the work De administrando imperio (On State Administration) from the middle of the 10th century, authored by the Roman Emperor Constantine VII Porphyrogenet. By claiming that Bosnia was created with the Ban Kulin Charter, the history of Bosnia, which goes back at least two centuries, is annulled.

Ban Kulin's charter should first of all be seen in the context of establishing official trade ties with Dubrovnik, an act that was of interest to both Dubrovnik and Bosnia. It is not known how the negotiations went, but it is assumed that the Latin text was first written in the Dubrovnik office, placed on top of the leather sheet, which was then sent to Bosnia so that the scribe Ban Kulin could write his translation underneath it and ratify the contract with the correct date and signature. The fact that the dijak Radoje is mentioned in the text of this charter speaks of the fact that there was an organized scribe's office in Bosnia as one of the important segments of the interior of the palace.

From the content of the charter itself, it can be learned that the Bosnian ban Kulin swore to the Dubrovnik prince Krvaš and all the citizens of Dubrovnik to be a true friend and that he would keep true peace and true faith with them until the end of his life.

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Zoran Perović, an employee of the State Archives in Dubrovnik, said that the Ban Kulin Charter mentions the residents of this city for the first time. Therefore, the aforementioned charter is of great importance for the history of the city of Dubrovnik. In addition to the aforementioned promises, Ban Kulin gave the people of Dubrovnik wide trade privileges.

He guaranteed full freedom and security to every Dubrovnik citizen, that he can move freely and trade in Bosnia without any taxes.

Exempting merchants from paying trade fees was a major concession, so Ban Kulin probably tried to attract Dubrovnik citizens to trade and travel in Bosnian territory with this diplomatic procedure. In the continuation of the charter, it is stated that the officials of Ban Kulin will not cause problems for the people of Dubrovnik who come to Bosnia to trade. In the entire charter, ban Kulin stands out in the foreground as a large, strong, and independent ruler who has absolute power and control over his country.



Ban Kulin's charter is preserved in three copies in Dubrovnik, but one of them is kept in the Library of the Russian Academy of Sciences in Saint Petersburg. This charter is of great importance because it represents the oldest evidence of trade relations between Bosnia and Dubrovnik that continued in the following period. Also, the aforementioned charter is one of the oldest documents written in the Slavic language. However, Ban Kulin's Charter should first of all be seen in the context of the establishment of diplomatic relations between Bosnia and Dubrovnik, which continued until the fall of medieval Bosnia under Ottoman rule in 1463.
